### **Trees**

No doubt many of the older residents can remember the countryside populated by large elm trees before the devastation caused by Dutch Elm Disease. There is evidence in hedgerows around Westbury Leigh of elm saplings, some of which are still surviving. But most eventually succumb to Dutch Elm, since they are suckers growing from elms that have died from the disease.

So it is good news that Westbury Leigh School is now taking part in the Great British Elm Experiment, organised by The Conservation Foundation. This involves various organisations around the country being supplied with elm saplings propagated from cuttings taken from parent trees which appear to have resistance to Dutch Elm Disease. Westbury Leigh School have received their sapling, which will shortly be planted in the school grounds. Then the children will be able to monitor and provide information on the growth of the sapling to The Conservation Foundation.

Let's hope that in time this experiment will herald the return of the elm and the traditional English landscape.

## **Chancel Screen**

If you're familiar with the inside of the Community Hall, you've probably noticed that there's a glass screen above the folding doors that separate the hall from the church. At the time of the building's conversion the panel in the centre of the screen was left blank, in the expectation that a suitable engraving could be added later.

That in the 1950s and 1960s Westbury Library was in the Town Hall in the Market Place? If you remember it, come along to the next meeting and share your memories. You have probably heard that the hours of the current library in Edward Street will be cut shortly by 5 hours a week. Do use our library - it may be small, but it is a valuable asset to Westbury and Westbury Leigh.
